Hazel Class Cyclopark Visit



Hazel Class were invited to participate in four cycling sessions at the Cyclopark in Gravesend. The balance and two-wheeled bicycles, tricycles, side-by-side tandems and go-carts were supplied by the venue. Our instructor encouraged all of the pupils to try out different types of bikes to find out which ones pupils were comfortable riding. He soon got us trying more challenging bikes and some of our pupils learnt how to ride a two wheeled bike independently!

The pupils gained a huge amount from the four sessions. Their fears and frustration were transformed to courage, confidence and pride. Pupils with physical and coordination difficulties were easily accommodated at the Cyclopark through a range of vehicles including electric powered tricycles and manual side-by-side tandems.

The pupils thoroughly enjoyed the sessions and were very eager to attend the following week. Our pupils with communication difficulties were inspired to initiate interactions with both peers and adults, whilst wearing huge smiles and giving great eye contact. Hazel Class are disappointed that our sessions have come to an end and have requested further sessions. Some pupils even want to visit the Cyclopark with their families and friends. The sessions are inspiring some of our families to purchase their own bicycles so they can have some fun and exercise together.



Communication and Phonics



Many pupils are being supported to develop the Foundations for Literacy. The aim is to build on their early communication skills which are supported using a range of different approaches including, Intensive Interaction, Attention Autism and Picture Exchange Communication System.

It is important that pupils embed and develop their early communication and language skills before they are able to access systematic synthetic phonics teaching.

At Ifield, we follow the Little Wandle Letters and Sounds (Revised) systematic synthetics phonics programme, which provides a consistent approach to teaching phonics across the school.

Little Wandle develops writing skills alongside reading skills. Initially pupils, will learn how to read and write words. When pupils are more proficient, they will read and write sentences.

During term 3, our phonics teaching will be enhanced with Big Cat phonic reading books. The reading books complement the Little Wandle programme and provide additional opportunities for pupils to practise their segmenting and blending skills as well as develop their reading fluency and comprehension skills.

Please note: At Ifield School, we teach phonics to our pupils when they are ready. Therefore, pupils may be above the age for the Reception or Year 1 phonics programme, although learning the same content. Please ask your child's class teacher where they have been placed on the programme, so that you can support accordingly.
